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Late Spring in Dockenfield

Spring is in her full splendour all over Dockenfield, the bluebells are out, the white flowers and lime green leaves of the Garlic Mustard are burgeoning under the hedges, the trees are bursting with blossom and brand new leaves and around the middle of April, if you are out in the early morning or the lengthening evenings when the air is still, and clear, and quiet, and the birds are in full voice you may be lucky enough to hear, amongst them, the elusive Cuckoo.

Each year Dockenfield residents have traditionally reported their first Cuckoo calls to the DNL, purely for interest, never for competition, and often recording differing dates in different parts of the Parish. This year I received my first report on the evening of the 17 th April from Anne Tutt, who heard the distant call at 5.34pm from Old Lane, Clair Jackson also heard it at around the same time, on the same evening, in the same location.

The Cuckoo is a spring migrant to our shores, over wintering in Africa when it leaves us; as early as July and as late as September; although it changes its call the longer it stays so you won't hear it cuckooing much beyond the end of May and only the male cries 'Cuckoo'!

This strange and clever bird is a mimic. It is a 'brood parasite' which means it lays its eggs in other birds' nests, so its eggs mimic those of its host; and its body mimics that of a Sparrowhawk, a predator of smaller birds, which allows the clever Cuckoo time to lay her eggs in the nest of the surrogate parent.



Wily, elusive and clever, you may well hear a Cuckoo in Dockenfield, but you may never see one. So, whilst reading this latest edition of the DNL, with your feet up in the garden and a cuppa for company, deciding what time to pop over to visit the Scarecrow Festival in Frensham or whether you can manage to volunteer for an hour in the tea tent on Dockenfield Day or marvelling over just how much rain we have actually had, listen out! You may hear the distinctive call of the Cuckoo.

Dockenfield Parish Council Annual Parish Meeting

This will be held on Tuesday 14th May 2024, 8pm at The Church of the Good Shepherd.

Our Annual Parish Meeting this year will feature our guest speaker **Mr. Roy Waight** and his talk "**Beyond Narnia to Dockenfield...Pauline Baynes**", refreshments, and the opportunity to meet, chat with and pose questions to your Parish Council representatives.

We do hope you can join us; it is always an interesting, friendly and productive evening and a great opportunity to meet the community especially if you are new to the village.

Hatch Field.

The hard work of the Parish Council's Open Spaces Group is beginning to pay off this spring. The newly seeded butterfly bank is covered with new growth and as the spring season progresses into summer, we will start to see the flowers blooming, hopefully bringing in a proliferation of butterflies.

The ephemeral pond has filled over the winter and is being colonised by a plethora of aquatic plants whilst its marshy edges are adding a further dimension of plant diversity.

The new hedge, that has been carefully tended, and protected by deer fencing over the last two years, is showing lots of strong fresh spring growth, and is thickening up nicely. In the future we will be able to remove the deer fencing as the hedge becomes more resilient to their browsing habits.

The scrub at the southern end of Hatch Field is becoming well established and is already home to several species of nesting birds.

Finally, DPC have been working on a long-term project to improve the grassy surface of part of Hatch Field. We are pleased to announce that over the next few months we are hoping to have a drainage system installed below the surface of the field's central section, south of the pond and north of the scrub. In the short term there will be some disruption on the field, and it will probably look quite dramatic, however, over the coming months as the sward recovers and starts to dry we believe that we can look forward to a better drained and drier section of the field in all seasons.

As the surface dries, we hope to cut the southern half of the grassland more regularly whilst leaving the northern grassy area to grow. This section will receive a twice-yearly cut designed to encourage an abundance of meadow wildflowers and increase biodiversity even further in what is becoming a wonderful haven of wildlife in the parish.

Frensham and Dockenfield Peddlars

Frensham and Dockenfield Peddlars kicked off their fourth season early April with stunning rides cycling through bluebell woods and along garlic scented paths which I am pleased to say I now drying out.

We have welcomed one new member from Dockenfield this year and he has joined up as a regular. F&DPs are a small group of local cyclists who meet every Thursday evening at 6pm for an approx 10 - 15 mile bike ride, the emphasis being on exploring our wonderful countryside and sharing stories along the way. There is a refuel along the way!

The Elder Tree

This lovely native tree has white sweet-smelling clusters of flowers which appear in late spring.

The flowers can be used to make herbal tea; champagne and wine; they can be eaten, battered whole and deep fried, delicious dipped in icing sugar. But by far my favourite thing to do with an abundance of gorgeous Elderflowers is to make cordial.

So here especially for you dear DNL reader is my recipe for Elderflower Cordial.

Ingredients:

10 large or 20 small elderflower heads (wash gently in cool water and lay on a tea towel to dry, remove most of the stalk),

1kg sugar (any kind, the darker the sugar the browner the cordial),

2 litres boiling water,

2 medium lemons (keep zest on and cut up),

1 medium orange (keep zest on and cut up),

40-45grams edible citric acid (a preservative, I use an organic version made from lemons, available online or a regular version from most chemists).



Method:

Place the boiling water in a large pan, (take care),

Add the sugar and stir until completely dissolved then bring to the boil (a rolling boil),

Turn off the heat, then add all the other ingredients and stir well,

Cover and leave to infuse for 24 hours.

Strain through a muslin lined sieve, reserve the liquid.

Pour into sterilized bottles and seal with airtight corks or lids.

This will keep for a few months, but not in our house, we drink it too quickly.

The cordial can also be frozen in ice cube trays and stored in a bag or tub in the freezer. Dilute to taste - we like 1:3 cordial: water.

N.B. If foraging anything from the wild, make sure you have the landowners' permission; only pick if you are 100% sure what you are picking; and always wash foraged produce thoroughly before use.

News from Bealeswood Common.

Following a mild and wet winter we have now had a mild spring with no April frosts that normally hold the wildflowers back. This means our wildflowers are blooming earlier than normal this year. But how much earlier? Our characteristic springtime flower, the Lesser Celandine, had its earliest flowering I have ever recorded. It was spotted flowering in the last week of December (2023) on Bealeswood Common before being knocked back by early January frosts. Most of our spring flowers have been in bloom a lot earlier than their recorded average over the last 15 years, some by over a month.



If you, or your family are keen to learn more about the wildflowers we have in the village, then why not join our summer walk over Bealeswood Common? Meet at the bench and noticeboard at the top of the Common (follow the track down past the Bluebell and it's on your right at the end) on Sunday 16th June, 10:00 – 12.00.
